Didi Gaudron

Didi Gaudron is a London based multi-disciplinary artist with Caribbean and mixed European heritage. Her practice references personal diasporic experience alongside interests in migration, colonial histories of slavery and their residues in the present. She studied at Central Saint Martins and graduated with a BA (Hons) Fine Arts in 2005.

Gaudron's prints and sculptures are held internationally in many collections including in the UK Antony Gormley's private sculpture collection. On the French Caribbean Island of Guadeloupe where Didi Gaudron's mother was born, maritime erosion caused by rising sea levels has exposed the remains of hundreds of bodies buried in a 18th century slave cemetery, located on a now popular beach. Human bones lay just a few inches below the sand where locals and tourists sunbathe. Gaudron dipped her own beach towel in plaster and let it dry. It stands like a ghostly shroud asking: How in the complexity of this beach can I find rest?

Ella Pitts-Payne

Multidisciplinary artist, Ella Pitts-Payne observes human phenomena and intervenes with art environments and public spaces. Ella subverts and reframes the "everyday", encouraging atypical experiences with art. Ella's work urges audiences to question familiar concepts, structures, and behaviours. Exploring themes of power, freedom, and grief, Ella's work critiques power structures, and deconstructs social conforms to make space for discussion and openness. Shrine 1 is a deeply personal artwork exploring sentimentality, hoarding and the universal human compulsion to build altars or shrines as points for contemplation in response to loss and grief. The work, built from inherited objects, lays bare a private ritualistic behaviour while acting as a channel for the artist's own loss.

"I hope my artwork offers a visual representation of the theme by exploring the complex interplay of emotions, transformation, and the healing process in the face of loss and grief. The black background of cogwheels, and shredded plastic can be seen as the darkness and turmoil associated with grief and loss, and the overlaid blood red organic form conveys the raw, emotional intensity of grief. The green/yellow electrical earth wire running through the composition connected to what appears to be raw flesh symbolizes renewal, a lifeline of the healing process.
